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Stepping into a New Year

A brand new bundle marked "A New Year" has been placed before us, which contains an assortment of days. For some there will be more than for others, but none can extract more than one at a time. We cannot count them all at once, for as the Word of God reminds us: "What is your life? It is even a vapor, that appeareth for a little time, and then vanisheth away."

A brand new year! We face it, each with our own thoughts. We think of tomorrow in the light and shadows of yesterday, sincerely desiring even to the point of earnestly promising ourselves that this year shall tell a better story. For many this will revolve about the business of resolutions—those solemn promises compiled in a long list of do's and don't.

A prominent psychology professor has expressed concern over this because it has become a joke with most people. After careful study, he has come up with a 7-step program for success in the endeavor, as follows:

- 1. Do not try to put the resolutions into effect all at once on the very first day. It would be better to arrange a "preparation period."
- 2. It would be better to start by drawing up a list of things you like to do; the enterprise will become easier in that manner.
- 3. Do not draw up a long list of some 10-30 resolutions; you will be defeated before you begin. Pick up only one or two resolutions at the commencement.

- 4. Do not seek to locate the most troublesome problem-not at the beginning. It will be better to pick out the relatively minor sore spots.
- 5. Make your intended resolutions as specific as possible. Do not be too vague, too general; do not try to cover too much territory.
- 6. When you have decided upon the resolutions, prepare to put them into effect. Tell your husband, your wife, what you plan. Think often of those resolutions. Get them deeply planted in your mind; in that way you will steel yourself for the job of actually keeping them.
- 7. The job itself will officially begin on "R-day," the actual date when you feel ready to start. Then work real hard at it!



And if "7" be the number of perfection, then it is all but bitter irony, for most people sense a "catch" in the program. It reads well, it means well, but where will the actual power come from to gain victory? Are you not conscious of a deep division between the desire and the actual doing?

You will get small comfort from the Bible, for it is silent on this matter of resolutions. But it cries aloud for a genuine spiritual revolution in the heart: "Ye must be born again," "We must be saved." There is no power in yourself as you are-for the Bible declares that you are "dead in trespasses and sins," "without strength." What, therefore, will give the power, grant the enabling for real living on a higher level? Not a 7-step program of human outreach, but a simple, single step of repentance and faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. This is a long proven reality, "If any man be in Christ, he is a new creature." He who said, "Behold, I make all things new," will thus possess the life in such a gracious and glorious way that you will be able to say, "For to me to live is Christ"; and "The life which I now live in the flesh I live by the faith of the Son of God, who loved me, and gave himself for me."

When you are His, this may well be your "resolution" for the days ahead, "This one thing I do, forgetting those things which are behind, and reaching forth unto those things which are before I press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus."



"The Holiness Life"

Without this experience in your life, you cannot see God.

This experience is of great importance to you. Without this experence it is an impossibility to live a victorious life in this present world.

This experience is a second definite work of grace. It is referred to many times as HOLINESS or SANCTIFICATION. Without this experience in our life, our life is in vain. We must seek the WHOLE will of God.

Let us notice that Holiness is required in our life. God requires every man and woman to live a HOLY life. In Hebrews 12:14 we read, "Follow peace with all men and Holiness, without which, no man shall see the Lord." This experience must be obtained while we are living in this present world.

Is he willing to walk by faith, and not by sight?" For us to be the man or woman that God can use effectively, we must be perfect toward God in all that we do.

Brengel gives us the words to the following song: "A humble, lowly, contrite heart,

Believing, true and clean A heart in every thought renewed And full of love divine

Perfect and right and pure and good,

A copy, Lord, of Thine."

Praise God for an experience that can keep us in this present day and age when there seems to be turmoil on every hand. We cannot afford to go one day without the Holy Spirit in our hearts for without Him we can do nothing. Without Him our life would be in vain. Without Him Heaven would be so far off, but with the blessed presence of the Holy Spirit in our life we have a little bit of heaven here to go to heaven in, THANK GOD.

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"The Fall"

Gen. 3:1-19 INTRODUCTION

The order of these three questions, 1st. "Where Art Thou, 2nd Who told Thee that thou was naked, and 3rd. What is this that thou hast done?" An eloquent preacher said a few years ago, "That man's only fall was a fall upward."

It is in such Flashy, Flippancy, Fancy Fable language that Modern infidelity clothes itself with its robe of unscriptural teachings. Regardless of the modern teachings of our last days man is a fallen Being, and all Human History proves it so as well as the infallible Word of God.

FIRST: Look At the Circumstances of the Fall —
(Serpentstances)

A. There was an animal used by a higher agency in this war that was then being staged against God, and Heaven.

1. There was a superior intelligence at work in this temptation, one who knew God, and had a knowlege of the Divine Command, one who was able to reason with Craft and Cunnning, and knew about good and evil, and could outwit Eve.

There is no open reference to Satanic agency; but there was a malignant cunning displayed which plainly points to him and his "devices."

B. This may be plainly gathered from the scriptures. Rev. 12:9. He is, "That old serpent, called the devil, and satan, which deceiveth the whole world."

C. 2 Cor. 11:3. "But, I fear, lest by any means, as the serpent beguiled Eve in his craftiness, your minds should be corrupted from the simplicity and the Purity that is toward Christ."

There can be no question that

the temptation in the garden by satan is the underlying thought of these pasages of Scripture.

SECOND: Look At the Craftiness of Satan

A. The subtlety of the devil is apparent in the whole process of the fall, which has cast a black shadow over the entire Human Race, which entailed Sufferings, Sorrows, Separations, and Sickness which we shall combat until Jesus Christ shall come and set up a "New Kingdom," where there shall be no more sorrow, nor sin.

Eve was tempted when alone and Her downfall would be easier and his victory sooner in his accomplishment.

B. A subtle suggestion is made against the fairness of the restriction placed upon them by God, and suspicion was placed on the Truthfulness of God, as the penalty of sin was flatly denied, "Ye shall not surely die." Then Eve was assured that there was great advantage in knowing "good and evil," and through the awakened desire for a new experience she fell, and carried Her Husband with Her into disobedience. It was the saddest knowledge ever gained.

While I was conducting a revival in Tuscon, Ariz. I met a young Man the age of 16 who had devout Christian Parents, but had gone the way of the unbelievers. He said to me, "How do you know that Jesus was Born of a Virgin? I said, because the Holy Word of God declares it to be so. Then He said, "How do you know the Bible is so? Then I said unto Him, and How do you know it is not so. He was listening to Men of Higher learnings, but ignorant to the True Way of Life.

The Bible says, "The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom: and the knowledge of the holy is understanding." Prov. 9:10.

The History of fallen Man is the History of inquiry. Down through the ages He has been on a great quest, the sum of which is to know not God, but to see and prove He does not exist, but "The fool hath said in his heart, There is no God." Psa. 14:1.

OUR THIRD and Last Thought of This Subject is the Cost of the Fall.

A. Death: Death had been announced to them as the penalty of disobedience, "The Soul that sinneth, it shall die." Ezek. 18:4, 20. Sin is fatal gangrene, the consuming leprosy of the Moral Universe.

B. Physical Death, Spiritual death, and last Eternal death. Apparently there was a provision for perpetual life, as the heritage of Man, or the exemption from death as we know it by sickness, pangs, and dread before the fall, but through the first sin came the expulsion from the "Tree of Life," and the sad penalty of physical death. Broken fellowship, fear, and alienation from God.

C. There comes also that Spiritual death. The Bible speaks of a Moral death of being, "Dead in trespasses and sins." (Eph. 2:1) Which consists in a separation of the soul from Communion with God, and is manifested by the corrupt dispositions and habits and carnal tendencies of the soul, as utter aversion to spiritual and heavenly things.

All who have not been made alive by Regeneration are now regarded as "Dead in trespasses and sins."

D. There is still the third degree of the results of the fall that is called "Eternal Death."

Eternal death is the final consequences of sin,

Eternal death means the eternal separation from God into complete, (Continued on page 10)

The Abiding Newness of the Religion of Jesus Christ

(Continued)

3rd Series by Rev. Frederick McCulley, of Syracuse, New York. This message was delivered to the Second Annual Interchurch Holiness Convention held at Penns Creek Camp Grounds, Penns Creek,

Penna. September, 1965.

But now leaving the direct scriptural application, let's consider this subject in the broader topical sense. When this message was given me, I did have time to finish the development of the outline, so our material from this point will reflect this curtailment.

Observe with me first, there is

an abiding newness in;

I. THE EVANGELICAL CHAR-ACTER OF ITS MESSAGE

The Gospel is literally, "good news". News, if it is news at all is always fresh and new. If it is old, it is not "news". When the Gospel is preached with the Holy Ghost sent down from Heaven, it becomes new to every man's awakened awareness of personal sinfulness. And all other things being equal, it beats preaching politics and Com-

munism at every turn.

We justly criticize present day religious liberals for their involvement in politics, and their leftward, collectivist inclination...But we should be careful in opposing this that we don't become political preachers ourselves, giving those who hear us the ulcerating emptiness of anti-communism in the place of the bread and wine of the Gospel! If our ministry is characterized by such an emphasis we are apt to produce corkscrew Christians who see Communists behind every bush, but who cannot see the drift from the evangelic spirit of our forebearers, or sense the dangers of Phariseeism. If there is any hope in this hour of confusing and ominous transition, it is not in quasi-religious political harangues.

I would like to see a revival in which preachers would take off the seven-league boots of non-scriptural political harangues, with which they stride roughshod into people's emotions, and put on their feet the "preparation of the Gospel of peace". I would that we could once more realize the power and effectiveness of the Sword of the Spirit (which is the Word of God and wield it against ancient, enemies, the Devil, Sin, and Carnality! I know that such preaching does not provide a short cut to relgious excitement as the communist issue does, but the excitement and interest it produces, when faithfully and prayerfully employed, is a healthy, helpful one. This sophisticated, bewildered, jaded generation with its rehash of old sins under new garb is dying for the abiding newness of the religion of Jesus Christ... May God help us to communicate to them!

There is also an abiding newness m;

II. THE CREATIVE GENIUS OF ITS SPIRIT

I know I run the risk of raising eyebrows when I say this, but some of you already have yours as high as they will go ... Every great revival has had its own peculiar character. God never does things exactly alike. We may be sure that if we see a major revival in our day it will involve some new things in Zion! Some old crusty ecclesiasticals will have to say: "I never saw it on this wise."

About 150 years ago when the as Kentucky, the McGee brothers, one a Methodist and the other a Presbyterian, made their way toward a settlement on the Red River in Kentucky where a sacramental service was appointed in the little Presbyterian church. The Methodist brother did the preaching, and so mightily did the Fire of the Spirit burn, that it became impossible to close the service. As the news spread, frontiersmen and their families made their way to the scene of the meeting, until the little church could not begin to hold the crowd. No one had ever heard of a Campmeeting, but necessity directed them to adjourn the services to a neighboring grove. Crowds as large as ten-thousand were in attendance, as the Spirit swept through the congregation felling stout men like balsam before the hurricane. Thus Campmeetings were born...Campmeetings, a new thing in Zion. . . And the denomination that was host to the first one couldn't go along with the newness. They fought campmeetings, split over the matter, and lost golden opportunity while the Methodists

realized that here was the fire of the Spirit, and did not quench it! Campmeetings, and the revival the Cane Ridge campmeeting heralded were without doubt the salavation of the American frontier, and in consequence the salvation of the nation.

There is an individual and collective creativity about the work of the Spirit, a creativity that produced Hester Anne Rogers, Mother Cobb, The Happy Alleganian, and a host of other unique and blessed characters. It is a creativity that lends an abiding newness, an eternal relevance to the religion of Jesus Christ! The fire of the Holy Ghost is able to burn up the stubble of sin, the hay of skepticism, and the wood of worldliness in our day! Hallelujah!

Then, there is an abiding newness in;

III. THE TIMELESS ETHICS OF ITS PRACTICE...

We are so geared to the temporal moral drift, that anything morally timeless and unchanging is new to us in any age. And every age needs an awakening morally that produces a consciousness of Christian-

ty's timeless ethics...

A genuine Spirit—quickened re-American frontier was as far east vival, far from producing a laxity in the ethics and piety of the church, will bring a keener separation from the world, a higher level of godliness. Her disciplinary standards will be relevant to our day and to the matter of holy living. Her piety will be genuine and not superficial. Her interests will be holy and healthy. Her faith will fight and not flag! The newness of God's abiding law will challenge decadent collectivist norms, until citadels of moral error come crashing to the ground.

Finally, there is an abiding new-

ness in;

IV. THE CLIMATIC HOPE OF ITS FULFILLMENT

"Light"

Read St. John 12:35 to 46.

"Light" the rule by which the

guilt of sin is estimated.

The great issues of the day are social, political, and relgious, but the greatest issue is this; Is the Bible God's infallible word of truth, the true light for this dark, sin cursed world? God answers this and says it is final; add not to, nor take away from the divinely in-

spired Word of God.

Light is God's view point on any matter. Light can be rejected, but remember, man chooses darkness because his deeds are EVIL. Cain rejected the light of his brother Abel's accepted, blood sacrifice, and cried out in the anguish of his soul, "My punishment is greater than I can bear". The Antideluvians rejected light under the preaching of Noah and perished in the mighty flood. Israel refused the light of God's law and the ministry of the Prophets of old until the wrath of God was poured out in Judgment upon them. Light rejected will become darkness as the drawing of the shades shuts out the light rays from your room.

Light is not to be stared at, but to walk in; I John 1:7 "But if we walk in the light, as he is in the light, we have fellowship one with another, and the blood of Jesus Christ his son cleanseth us from all sin." To stare at light, is to put out ones sight. Just lay down at noon and look staringly at the sun and see what it does to your vision. This blind church crowd of today, that have looked, questioned, and made fun of God's light on the Bible standards of dress, diversions, and separation from the world, calling them non-essentials, and old traditions of the church, until now they see nothing wrong in anything that has a little flavor of religious life, and professes outward respectability. They are blinded by staring at the light, until all is blurred, and they say, "I can't see anything wrong in this." God give us a real pity, and burden for this willfully blind crowd.

Any one form of sin is fatal to the soul. The Bible says in James 2:10, "He that keepeth the whole law, and yet offend in one point, he is guilty of all." This thought is further expressed in St. Luke 16: 10, "He that is faithful in that which is least is faithful also in much: and he that is unjust in the least is unjust also in much." Sin is a transgression of the law, but sin is also the neglect of known duty to God. Isaiah said, they have eyes to see but they see not.

In the beginning God said, "Let there be light and there was light". (Gen. 1:3) John the beloved says of Jesus, "In Him was life; and the life was the light of men. And the light shineth in darkness; and the darkness comprehendeth it not." (St. John 1:1-5) "He was the true Light, which lighteth every man that cometh into the world." (St. John 1:9) You are sure to get the truth from the Bible. Jesus Christ, the true Light, is the Incarnate Truth, for the Word became life and pitched his tent among us. (St. John 1:14 & 1 John 1:1-3)

God's Word is Light (Psalm 119: 105 & 130) "They word is a lamp unto my feet, and a light unto my path." "The entrance of thy words giveth light." God's works are light; (St. John 15:24) "If I had not done among them the works which none other man did, they had not had sin: but now have they both seen and hated both me and

my Father."

God's will is Light; (II Peter 3:9) "The Lord is not willing that any should perish, but that all should come to repentance." (I Thess. 4a) "For this is the will of God, even your sanctification."

Man needs this light to penetrate his own darkened heart and reveal all sinfulness. Man must feel himself a sinner before he will become a penitent seeker for mercy and grace from God. Consider David when Nathan said, "thou art the man". Hear his penitent pleading

for mercy in Psalm 51.

Guilt is ascribed to the intention or motive. Think of a child facing his parents and saying, "honestly I didn't know it was wrong, or I didn't mean to disobey, and the punishment is lessened, but the truth is established, and obedience to the light they have received is required from then on. Once the light has been revealed, one cannot keep on sinning and plead innocent before God.

Sin is infinite because it is a willful transgression of God's infinite law. All willful sin deserves endless punishment. Yet the light one has received will no doubt determine the degree of punishment. The Bible seems to reveal the fact that there will probably be degrees of glory in Heaven and degrees of punishment in hell. Great light

then great guilt!

God gives light on tithing, praying, dress, pleasure, separation from the world, righteous and holy living, marriage, divorce and remarriage, parenthood, duties of husband to wife and wife to husband, and children to parents. Thank God for the Bible, you had better study it more. It is God's book to man, that he might know the truth of mortal life, his immortal spirit, a Heaven to gain and a Hell to shun, for he is sure to spend eternity in one of those two places. Don't charge the heathen too much for their awful sins, they are in darkness, but judge yourself as God will judge you by the light that you have received.

The Motive for Missionary Work

The Apostle Paul towers above all early church leaders as the outstanding missionary of his day— In writing to the early Church at Corinth he declared in 2 Cor. 5:14, "the love of Christ constraineth us..." or we would say today "compelleth us." There are various reasons for missionary work, but Paul reaches the highest motive when he asserts it is the "love of Christ." This "love of Christ" is the very heart of missionary work.

Every student of church history knows that the Church of Jesus Christ has made incredible progress when her chief aim has been the savation of precious souls. It was true in Paul's day though imperialism and idolatry covered the face of the earth as the waters cover the sea. But men filled with the "love of Christ" went everywhere preaching the forgiveness of sins through the merits of the shed blood of Jesus Christ, the crucified and risen Saviour. This love compelled them to go. How could they keep silent when it burned in their hearts with unspeakable glory,

beauty and power?

Their hearts were thrilled at the prospects of taking this glorious gospel to the heathen multitudes of their time. The religions and countless gods of that age did not bring peace to the heart, forgiveness to the soul and joy to the life. Christ did! And blessed be God, He still does! It is also just as true that the religions and idols of heathenism today have no more power to have than when Paul wrote those mortal words, "the love of Christ constraineth us." There are more people today without God's salvation than when the apostles and disciples placed their all on the altar for sacrifice and service that a lost world might know the blessings of heart-felt salvation.

It is the plan of Satan to alter our motives for missionary work to some type of humanistic approach. I had only been saved a few months when I heard a missionary from the Orient relate how a young man had been sent to their field who proudly brandished his revolver with the remark that if any pagan got rough with him he was prepared to defend himself most creditably. Just as soon as the service was dismissed I went to the missionary speaker and asked, "How could anyone be so void of the true gospel message?" The missionary replied, "It all depends upon where such candidates are from: some conferences stress the spiritual while others do not." I walked away dazed! I realized for the first time as a young convert that one can even be a missionary with a misplaced humanist approach to the spiritual needs of lost souls. Paul cried, "the love of Christ constraineth us." Only as we are guided by this motive of love shall we win many souls for our blessed Lord.

There is another way Satan sidetracks the church: let us call it doctrinal polemics, or disputing about areas of truth rather than winning a lost world for Jesus Christ. The longer I evangelize in North Africa the more sickened at heart I become for it was argument and disputing by the Christian Church over baptism that lost to God's kingdom this great part of the continent. God gave the primitive Christian Church after Pentecost priority to the whole field of North Africa. History records that for over a century or so great progress was made in the evangelization of this part of the world. Then Satan instigated bitter disputings over the scriptural type of water baptism. While the church wrangled about baptism the hordes of Mohammed swept in and conquered North Africa. This powerful foe of the church of Christ has predominated now through the centuries. One has only to live and labor here to feel its tremendous power and its deathless determination to crush the Christian Church. Oh, the fearful and ruinous price the church has paid when wrong motives set the guide-lines for her labors, practices and progress.

Today there are missionary groups operating in most parts of the world. It cannot be denied that much fruitlessness is due to

Also He claimed to know, claims to know, all about the life beyond the valley. He said: "In my Father's house are many mansions. I go to prepare a place for you."


Such assurance and such promises! Was He a fraud? Or a wild man?

Goal posts?! They should be set so that they reflect the light of the "better country."

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
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
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
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

These objectives are most worthy, but these things can be accomplished with a humanistic approach and a trained personnel. But beloved, this is not enough! Missionaries are needed who are motivated by the greatest principle set forth by a holy God, "the love of Christ." How different the picture would be today if the leaders of the many emerging nations were truly "born again."

How I thank God for the privilege of evangelizing with Evangelistic Faith Missions in Africa in 1961, 1963 and then again in 1964 where the emphasis has been: first, the heart, then trusting God for "the other things." This is the real motive for missionary workand anything short of this is indicative of that lack of "love of Christ." An individual, denomination or missionary society should be guided by the highest motive to be found for missions: "the love of Christ constraineth us." This love compelled Paul to take the glorious gospel of Jesus Christ to the world in his generation. It will do the same today. God bless you as you pray and give for the salvation of lost humanity.

A Tale of Mercy Rejected

I am quoting two verses of scripture found in Exodus, the first is in chapter 8, verse 32, "And Pharaoh hardened his heart" and chapter 9 verse 12, "And the Lord hardened the heart of Pharaoh." Now these two statements would sound contradictory if you look at them superficially, but it must not have seemed so to the writer who wrote both of these as he had witnessed the thing himself. Moses was the writer. The first text is very easily understood. Pharaoh hardened his heart. This can be said of all who were in sin very long. We, too, one time raised our puny arms in defiance against God's law and love until sin had calloused our hearts.

The second text which states that the Lord hardened the heart of Pharaoh puzzles and shocks us, but if we study this we will soon see revealed to us that there is no contradiction here. Some would have us believe that Pharaoh was destined to do what he did but that is not true. The means that God uses to bring us to Himself, when rejected, are the means of hardening the heart; for he that shuts out love, in turn, shall be shut out by love.

Pharaoh's case was typical of millions who have rejected God's love such as Esau, Saul, and scores today are in the same case. It is happening round about us yet today as men harden their hearts against God rejecting the overtures of God's mercy. Man may harden his heart against God. Pharoah said, "I have sinned against the Lord." He was not ignorant concerning what he was doing. He realized the fact that he was sinning and yet he went right on in his own rebellious ways. After five plagues have finally been sent upon Egypt to bring him under subjection to God's will, we then notice in God's word where it said that God hardened Pharaoh's heart. Surely God had given him a lot of opportunities before that time, but opportunities which had been trampled under his feet and had been rejected by Pharach. Notice the limit of divine mercy. We are not shut out by an act of God, but by our own choice,

our own action, our own rebellion.

Man chooses the way of sin by his own volition, by his own act. What part has God in hardening the hearts of men? Notice the process when an actual law is broken. This process takes place: There is first of all the law of habit, foundations of character are built upon the law of habit. It crystalizes people either in righteousness or in sin. Never let a man be bold enough to say, "Thus and no farther shall my passion stray." The first crime compels us on to more. When you begin you say, "I will not open my heart." And when sin is finished you say, "I can not open my heart."

We read of the Pharisees, at first they would not believe and later on they could not believe.

They had exercised their unbelief to that degree that unbelief laid claim to their lives. Unbelief caused them to continue on in unbelief, until unbelief seemed to be the only act they could commit against Jesus Christ. Yes, the process is gracious as well as judicial.

Man is hardened by what should have softened by the very act of God which should have brought them to a place of repentance they are hardened, abused mercy finally turns to wrath. God would spare Egypt; that was His desire. He sent the plagues upon it in His mercy for God afflicts many times in mercy, but mercy, my friend, is not weakness. The process of hardening illustrates the power of God. God wins the victory; He always does.

When there came the time of ultimate judgment on Pharaoh it was fully realized then that God was victorious in the battle. Oh yes, my friend, God won the victory and He always will. Man shall not be able to continue on forever in his rebellion against God.

Sinner friend, as you read just now it is a dangerous road that you walk; it is a dangerous process that you follow, for every day that is passed on in sin and rejection again God is hardening your heart making it just a little more difficult for you to come to God. The process of hardening is not done all at once, it is gradual. Day by day the sordid work of sin goes on. The soul deepens in dishonesty and the heart is soon steeled against God. Oh, my friend, when we think of how character is

formed by the acts which become habits in our life and determine our character, youthful purity should be guarded or soon the heart can be hardened. Willful sin becomes a compelling force, lust is mightier than all man's determination. We can lose our spiritual faculties until spiritual blindness takes place and there becomes that fatal injury to the soul until man drifts on away and farther away from God's mercy and God's grace.

Oh, my friend, if you have a spiritual need this is the hour, this is the time, this is the opportune moment for you to seek and find Jesus Christ as your Saviour. He is near at hand, He wants to meet your need, He wants to meet you just now.
