George Washington was a man of prayer.



The set of the head and the strange carriage of the shoulders were a familiar sight to any of those men of the Virginia militia With a steady step, the form of this man moved on down the shadowy aisle, and for a moment the flickering candle threw a golden ray upon the rugged cheeks of the man as he knelt.

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Holiness - Live It!

The story is told that in the army of Alexander the Great there was a soldier who was known for his cowardice in time of battle. He shared the same name as his leader - Alexander. On one occasion the man who eventually conquered the then -known world called this soldier into his presence and placed an ultimatum before him. "Sir, I understand that your name is Alexander and that you have demonstrated great cowardice on the battlefield. Sir, either conquer your cowardice or change your name!"

Upon hearing this story I thought of the situation in the conservative holiness movement today. We are in trouble in holiness ranks because of inconsistent fruit. Either we should produce the fruit of holiness or else drop the name. As I gaze over the movement called the "holiness movement" I see two major problems. The first has to do with the way we preach holiness and the second has to do with the practice of holiness.

There is a danger from both sides of the road; we may fall into the ditch on either side and not accomplish what God intends. Some preach holiness with no demands for cleansing, no death to the carnal nature and no celebration of joy when the funeral anthem is played. It is a bland, humaninspired experience in which you give yourself to God in some sort of deeper work that is nice to have, but is not essential to enter heaven.

Others sing "it's not an easy road" while they pile up requirements that are extra-Biblical, lay on burdens that the Holy Spirit never intended us to bear and generally make holiness as attractive as the long-eared mule in the barnyard. I have never felt that sadness and holiness were synonymous, and yet some holiness people would impress you only with terrible strain they are enduring to

meet the legalistic demands of their self-generated experience.

Either stop this denigration of the experience in our preaching or else stop using the name!

We sing the song: Holiness forevermore Holiness forevermore We will sing it, shout it Preach it and live it Holiness forevermore!

Yet the most evident breakdown comes when we try to live it. Sing, yes, shout, indeed, preach, but of course, live here's the rub. More and more individuals are being turned from the holiness doctrine because of inconsistent living. The answer is not to bring this glorious doctrine down to the level of our experience, but rather to go to the Word, discover what the life of holiness really requires and with the enduement of the Holy Spirit, live that life to the fullest.

Fussing, fuming, quarreling, party spirit, church politics have turned many people away. We can excuse ourselves by saying, "They don't want our standards," but I am convinced that our standards are not nearly so much the problem as is our inconsistent living. As Vance Havner puts it, we have preached "a dynamite gospel, but lived firecracker lives."

Holiness is a song to be sung, a jubilation to be shouted, a doctrine to be preached and an experience to be lived. It will be lived in human, earthen vessels, with infirmities and mistakes, with faults and failures in our humanity, but nonetheless lived with a heart filled with perfect love which responds in love to every situation and circumstance. The challenge comes to us to live the experience or drop the name. We can live holiness with Him in our hearts!

Holiness - Its Origin!

Editor's Note: With this issue we begin a series on the vital subject of holiness by Rev. Paul Miller, our esteemed Assistant General Superintendent. Your heart will be blessed as you read these timely articles.

The first requirement in the study of Holiness is to know the origin of Holiness. If we can firmly establish this truth, it will eliminate any argument concerning the need of it. We will attempt to establish this truth, define any terms related to the Biblical doctrine and to set forth its qualities and character.

"That God is" is without question. God never began by explaining His existence nor making apology for His existence, He introduced Himself and all created things by simply saying "In the beginning God!"

Any scientific investigation of this stated fact leads to either confusion or atheism. God cannot be placed into a test tube nor under a microscope and analyzed like any created substances or manufactured chemical. If we try to limit an eternal God to earthly substances or thinking we do Him a great irreverence and bring ourselves into thinking we are all little gods equal with Him, this is the common thinking of our day and is called humanism. We must never question His existence or His works. Few have really doubted the existence of God. and that few have who have are declared by the Word of God to be fools. (Psalms 53:1) Isaiah 57:15, declares that He is the high and lofty one who inhabits eternity; fathom this simple, yet profound declaration and you have answered any question about His pre-existence. Fathom this I say, but to do so takes a lifetime of sincere and earnest study.

In all our studies we have found it difficult indeed, to really know God or more so, what He is like. Isaiah, (40:18; 40:25; 46:5) asks, "Unto whom will you liken God?" Finite men can only guess or imagine what an infinite God is like. To try to understand this unfathomable truth we must turn to the attributes of God, those qualities that are attributed to God and to God alone. A few of these are: omnipotence, omnipresence, omniscience, justice, love, and eternity. If we can get just a smattering of knowledge and understanding of these we will begin to understand God.

The one attribute that is of special interest to us in this study is His holiness. While few Scriptures refer to His omnipresence etc. at least sixty (60) scriptural references declare His holiness. All of our ideas about God and our judgments of Him must be made with His holiness in mind, that God is infinitely holy is without doubt.

In every vision of Him it was His holiness that was spoken of and revealed. Isaiah, chapter six, saw not the gentleness nor the love of God, but the holiness of God. So infinite was that holiness that he immediately saw how unholy and undone was he and cried, "Woe unto me for I am a man of unclean lips and dwell with a people of unclean lips."

Pause now and think for a few minutes about God, what do you think firstly about Him? Do you see His goodness or His Holiness? Do you think firstly of His love or His Holiness? of His forgiveness or His Holiness? (Compare Revelation 4:8) I asked a young couple, who had come to me for counseling, what they thought about God? Both answered, "I think He is some undescribable being way off into space who is so much greater and higher than we are that we cannot approach Him." Both of them expressed the sentiments of Isaiah, both were correct in their assumption, yet, both were wrong. It was their idea of God that they excluded all other attributes, so do most of us. When we compare ourselves with God we see His holiness and man's sinfulness, impurities, insignificance and smallness.

We cannot by-pass this important truth. Our concept of God and His holiness will determine the depth of our spiritual life. Obscure holiness and we are relieved from the blackness of sin. In our investigations of God, we too often see His love, mercy, and forgiveness that we forgot His holiness. When we do this we no longer see the sinfulness of sin, God becomes a soft, easy-going ruler who over looks all our wrong and sinfulness. While God is gracious and will forgive our sin's and abundantly pardon us He will never over look our

wrong nor excuse our sinning.

The more we lighten sin and make it of no significance the more we uncrown our Redeemer. Redemption speaks of His holiness. If sin is of such little importance then a crucified Redeemer was superfluous, His death and resurrection was all unnecessary and this light view of sin and His holiness causes us to accept a cheap redemption.

Let me be quick to state that sin is exceedingly sinful, God is infinitely holy and that redemption is neither cheap nor superfluous. Will you pause with me and think about Gethsemene; the agonizing prayer, the great drops of blood and the total committment to the will of the Father. Will you look once again upon the hall of Judgment, the scourgings, the false witnesses, the final "Away with Him, crucify Him". Gaze upon the cross, the agony, suffering, the cruel nails, the unsatiable thirst and the unmindedness of the Father. Does all this tell us anything about the holiness of God. With all this in mind we cannot afford to go in sin nor to look for an easier way, for there is none.

Without His holiness we could never hope to be better nor feel better. Love and forgiveness helps us to feel better. It gives a feeling of great emotion and sentiment but holiness elavates us to a higher and purer life. A cheap forgiveness could do no more than confirm the sin it forgave, but His holiness makes it possible to remove the sin. Holiness is not the sentimental search of the Redeemer for a wayward son, it is an eternal wrestle with sin.

A refusal to accept the forgiveness of God for sin brings us face to face with the judgement. For if the love of God demands forgiveness of sin, the holiness of God demands punishment for the sinner. Sin must be judged and punished or God is not just and His Word is not true. His holiness demands both truth and justice. Look at the sin around us, crime, murder, political oppression, and social injustice could an infinitely holy God allow this to go unpunished? Never! it must be judged either at the cross or at the throne. Beneath the darkness of the cross we see the whiteness of the throne. God is not only infinitely holy but He is eternally holy. He always was, He now is, and He always will be holy. Holiness began with God and is as old as God Himself and He demands that we be holy. (Matt. 5:48; I Peter 1; 15 & 16) To be continued:

Text-Exekiel 36:26, A new heart also will I give you, and a new spirit will I put within you: and I will take away the stony heart out of your flesh, and I will give you an heart of flesh.

But she looked so young and we longed for her and the little one she was carrying to live. She did. God spared her life because He was also striving to save her soul. She was one of those for whom Jesus shed His precious blood. But, I am getting a bit ahead of my story.

After the baby girl was born, Rosela continued to come to the clinic for vitamins. She still seemed so anemic, so frail. One day she saw our visiting Haitian doctor who immediately suspected tuberculosis. The mother was put on a T.B. regime, and we begain to give the baby preventative treatment.

One day she came into our clinic out of the hot Haitian sun, wearing a heavy, fleecy blue robe. I couldn't believe she could be feeling cold. I wondered if perhaps that was all she had to wear. Then, another thought came to us. Why was it that Rosela lived right in our own little community of La Croix, and yet never came to our church? So, we asked her that day, "Rosela, who don't you ever come to church? Do you go to another church?" Her head dropped. "Miss, I don't have anything suitable to wear to church."

Often we tell the people, "Listen, you don't need nice clothes to come to church. Whatever you have will be fine." But this time I didn't say it. I remembered some clothes that had been sent to us which I thought would be about her size. I asked, "Is that the only reason you don't come?" The answer was "yes".

We brought her over to the house and found a nice dress for her and some clothes for the baby, too. She was very pleased though still very quiet. The expression of her eyes was enough to let us know. Then we asked, "Rosela, are you already a Christian? Do you know Jesus?" She answered, "I used to be saved, but my father stopped me." I asked if her people would now permit her to come to church, and she was sure they would. We told her we would be praying and looking for her in church Sunday.





Big business is finding that "Jesus Sells," the Los Angeles Times reports, citing such examples as Disneyland, which is now scheduling two Christian-oriented nights each year, and fast-selling Christian T-shirts. Additional secular companies, such as Scott, Foresman & Company, and MCA Records, are buying into the lucrative Christian book and music industry. The American Research Corporation last spring commissioned a George Gallup Poll of Christians; buying habits: ARC officials say about 150 clients have paid up to \$1,250 for the lengthy "Profile of the Christian Marketplace 1980," based on Gallup's studies. The emergence of Christianity as a marketing factor is more noticeable in southern California than elsewhere nationwide, said the Times.

In (a) personal sense, revival should be a constant reality. The idea that if is "a thing of special times and seasons" owes its inception to the inconsistent nature of man and not the will of God. Unfortunately, for most of us, despite our professions there come those periods of spiritual sluggishness which make revival necessary. But if we lived in the continual fullness of the Spirit of Christ, as God desires, revival would be an abiding state of experience.

(In Norman P. Grubb's little book, Continuous Revival,) the author mentions how he was shaken out "of the misconception of years, that revival could only come in great soul-shaking outpourings of the Spirit." Of course, he rejoices in the times when the church was mightily stirred in "precious hurricanes of the Spirit," but as he say, "I saw the defeatism and almost hopelessness that so many of us had fallen into by thinking that we could do nothing except pray, often rather unbelievingly, and wait until the heavens rent and God came down. But now I see 'revival' in its truest sense is an everyday affair right down within the reach of everyday folk to be experienced in our hearts, homes and churches, and in our fields of service. When it does

break forth in greater and more public ways, thank God; but meanwhile we can see to it that we are being ourselves constantly revived persons, which of course also means that others are getting revived in our own circles."

The Challenge Of Faith!

Jesus said, "If ye have faith as a grain of mustard seed, ye shall say unto this mountain, remove hence to yonder place; and it shall remove; and nothing shall be impossible unto you," (Matt. 17:20).

Several aspects of faith are revealed in the Word of God. There is the aspect of "historical faith" the foundation upon which all other faith is built. God has preserved the records of history which reveal the development and demonstration of faith in the lives of others. As we read the accounts of God's working through the faith of others, our own hearts are brought to believe in God and His concern for mankind.

When this kind of foundation is laid it is not difficult to cultivate "saving faith". "Without faith it is impossible to please him: for he that cometh to God must believe that he is, and that he is a rewarder of them that diligently seek him." (Hebrews 11:6).

This verse indicates that "historical faith" is prerequisite to "saving faith". We must believe in the existence of God as the eternal God and accept His Word as absolute, or there is no foundation for "saving faith".

The third aspect of faith is "living faith". According to Hebrews 10:38 "saving faith" is prerequisite to "living faith". "Now the just shall live by faith." I have come to realize as never before that faith is the lifeline of the children of God. Faith in God is that which keeps us conscious of our dependence upon God for our physical, material, and spiritual needs. When we lose that consciousness we develop an independent attitude which drives us further and further from an intimate relationship with God.

Many in America have had so much that they never really had to learn to live by faith. When one has found himself in rather undesirable circumstances he has found it rather convenient to change those circumstances without a consciousness of dependence upon God. Now that things are tightening up making jobs more difficult to find and money is not flowing so freely many are becoming frustrated. Everyone enjoys prosperity but I think we must face the fact that prosperity tends to generate a spirit of indifference or a feeling of self-sufficiency which causes faith to become flaccid. This is evident in the great number of church people who have already suffered shipwreck and the host of others all around us whose faith is wavering.

Something must be done to restore faith in God as our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble. (Psalms 46:1)

It seems logical to me that we can strengthen our faith by searching for a better understanding of what faith is. The only actual definition of faith given in the Bible is found in Hebrew 11:1. "Now faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen."

Substance is defined as "ultimate reality whether material or spiritual." In the spiritual sense it is an underlying assurance. The original means "firm confidence".

Abraham portrayed this thought according to Romans 4:20, 21. "He staggered not at the promise of God through unbelief; but was strong in faith giving glory to God; and being fully persuaded, that what he had promised, he was able to perform."

Truly the promises of God would overwhelm the natural man. Without that underlying assurance he would say impossible, it cannot be done, but Jesus said, "If ye have faith as a grain of mustard seed, nothing shall be impossible unto you." O Lord increase our faith! D. L. Moody said, "Faith is the golden link binding us to every promise of God."

Evidence is defined as "an outward sign, indication or token." The original word signifies demonstration or conviction. Such evidence is not ascertained by our senses or even by our reason but by an inward persuasion which is built upon firm confidence in the living God.

Oswald Chambers said, "Faith is not intellegent understanding, faith is deliberate commitment to a person where I see no way."

Andrew Murray expressed it this way, "Faith is setting our wills to have what God has willed for us."

Genuine faith appears to me to be the act of believing God to answer prayer independent of our psychological influence upon those whom He may choose to use as instruments of service for His own honor and glory.

Having been in pioneer work for most of my life prior to coming to Penn View, I thought I had learned a little about living by faith; however, facing the staggering costs of operating a Christian school in these days of inflation has a way of taxing one's faith to the very limit.

Though our family needs seemed very great at times, if faith did not produce the desired results I could usually find a job of some sort and make enough money to see us through. As I look back now, I realize that taking such a resource did not build strong faith.

George Mueller said, "One important point for the strengthening of our faith is to let God work for us. When the trial of your faith comes, do not work a deliverance of your own."

I always felt that this was the lazy way out, and I never could stand a lazy person. People would tell me that a preacher should not work the way I was working, but I had adopted the philosophy of an old preacher friend of mine who said, "I can trust God but I can't trust people to obey God." More than once he said to me, "You can talk about living by faith all you want to, but you cannot eat it." He had been on hard scrabble circuits a long time; however, as I see it now, he had never really learned to live by faith.

Most of us in America have suffered the same type of spiritual anemia while enjoying material prosperity for so many years. It has been easier to work a deliverance of our own than to wait on the Lord until He willed to br-(Continued on Page 12)

ing it to pass. Many of us are guilty of this in the material, physical and spiritual aspects of life.

What a difference it makes when one comes to the place that there is no possible way to work a deliverance of his own. He has no alternative but to trust in the Lord.

I have come to that place right here at Penn View Bible Institute. There is no possible way that I can figure to make enough money to meet the operational costs and pay off the indebtedness. We have earnestly promoted the "Dollar Membership Family" across the years and enrolled a total of 3,600 members - enough to underwrite the annual deficit if it were not for the fact that only 600 of them remained active in the past year.

We have been calling for volunteers

to join "Gideon's Band" and help liquidate our indebtedness. In one and one-half years we have recruited 54 of the 300 we need to reach our goal. Our last appeal in this paper was absolutely fruitless in so far as not one person returned the certificate for enlistment.

I am not complaining nor scolding, and I am not discouraged. I am just thinking aloud as I search for God's answer to our dilemma. I know that many of you have done your best. You have given sacrificially and I deeply appreciate it; however, we are still in need of thousands of dollars just to pay current bills, some of which are already overdue.

In searching for God's answer I have been reading as well as praying. As I read A.E.C. Brook's book on "Answers to Prayer" from George Mueller's Narratives, I asked myself the question, Have we been exercising faith in God on depending on man's ingenuity? There is no doubt

that God uses human instrumentalities, but our faith must be completely in God. Certainly God has honored our efforts and provided enough to keep us from going under but continually allowing our faith to be tried. No doubt He wants to strengthen our faith. Perhaps He wants to teach us how to operate a Christian school totally by faith. Truly God is working out His purpose, and I want to do my best to cooperate with Him.

My heart cries out in the words of the poet:

"O for a faith that will not shrink, Though pressed by every foe, That will not tremble on the brink Of any earthly woe!"

"Faith, mighty faith, the promise sees, And looks to that alone;

And tooks to that alone; Laughs at impossibilities, And cries, "It shall be done"!
