It was Freddy's birthday, and he had received a picture puzzle from his parents as a gift. Naturally intrigued with his gift he tried all afternoon to put the pieces together, but to no avail. Some of the pieces were bright, some were dark; they were in various sizes and shapes. Some of them didn't even seem to fit anywhere at all. Finally in his frustration he took the pieces and the box in which they came, to his father. "Daddy, you try it. I can't do it." Maxwell Cornelius penned this poignant expression of trust:

But, that's not all! There is an even higher level of commitment to the will of God. That is to be able to thank God for what you do not and can never humanly understand. The noble apostle Paul, whose trust in God's divine design had been tested in the vale of extreme suffering, wrote to the believers in Thessalonica "Rejoice evermore. Pray without ceasing. In everything give thanks; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus concerning you." The Amplified Bible renders this verse, "Thank [God] in everything - no matter what the circumstances may be, be thankful and give thanks: for this is the will of God for you [who are] in Christ Jesus [the Revealer and Mediator of that will].

It is at this point in the sanctified life that the matter of discipline a evolves. One does not automatically find praise on his lips for everything in life. Disciplined thankfulness will bring rich rewards in our lives. Remember - we see only the pieces. He sees the picture!

FIRST THINGS FIRST

Have you ever tried to paint one of those paint-bynumber paintings? One winter while we lived in Findlay, my wife and I did two of those paintings. Mine never got finished for one reason or another, but she did one that was really beautiful. It was an English cottage with a thatched roof surrounded by a lovely flower garden. The color blend was absolutely fantastic.

In those painting sets we received instructions that had to be followed very carefully. We were told to go over the canvas and locate all the areas with a special number and paint these areas first. These special areas were background areas. We could not see the purpose of this instruction until the whole canvas was finished.

Often people are impatient to paint, so instead of doing what they should do first they begin to paint the big areas, covering the canvas quickly, but they soon discover to their dismay that they cannot add the background areas later.

As I thought one day about our winter excursion into painting by number I couldn't help but compare it to the Christian life. As I reflected and thought I realized that in the Christian life, like those paint-by-number sets, there were some things that had to be done first. By their very nature these things could not be added later. They had to be done first because they were the background for all the rest of living.

Jesus was thinking about this very thing when He spoke the words found in Matthew, chapter 6 and verse 33. "Seek ye first the kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all these things shall be added unto you." These words sound like the instructions in a paint-by-number set. Jesus is saying: "Do you know why so many believers get side-tracked in their Christian life? It is because they do not follow My simple instructions. They never learn that there are some things that must be done first." Look carefully at these first three words, "Seek ye first."

The word "seek" describes an attitude more than an action. It is far more than the mere action of looking for something. It has to do with the "set of your will," or "the direction of your life."

The Christian life is not a series of quick sprints but one long tiring marathon. Speed and effort are not as important as the direction you are going.

Then there is the word "first" ... "Seek ye FIRST". When Jesus was making the point here He was speaking more about importance than time. He is speaking about order and priority. I hear believers talking about their devotion habits and in

the course of the conversation they tell how they always give God the first few minutes of each day for their Bible reading and prayer. They do this because they have been told God must have the priority in their lives. When Jesus spoke about putting first things first. He wasn't thinking about the clock. He was thinking about the heart! I'm not discouraging early morning Bible reading and prayer, but one could do this faithfully and know nothing of what Jesus is teaching here.

Jesus said that two things must command your attention first as you take up the brush to work on the canvas of your life; they are, "the kingdom of God and His righteousness." If you do not have "kingdom interests" and "holy living" as the primary concern in your life, you can be certain that none of the other brush marks will even blend to make an attractive protrait. They cannot be added later. By their very nature they must be on the canvas of your life before any other color is added. They are the background, the very foundation of every other thing you do in life. Isn't that exactly what Jesus said, "all these things shall be added unto you." What you do and what you eat and what you wear and what you possess of this world's goods is important, but never as important as living a life under the Lordship of Jesus Christ and sharing his very nature. In fact, without these two things all these other things are drab and colorless.

Though you would not be aware of it in our English Bibles, there is a play on words here. In verse 32 the word "seek" is also used. "For after all these things do the Gentiles seek." Both words mean seek, and both words should have been translated as they are. The one in verse 32, the one describing the Gentiles (the unbelievers) means a "seeking that knows no bounds." It is a seeking that is spurred on by a unbridled appetite for things. While the one in verse 33 means "seeking within a carefully narrowed path," it is a seeking that purposefully rejects some appeals. The only thing that will keep the colors of your life blending as they should is to first allow Jesus to be Lord of your life and impart His very nature within. As you take up the brush to add a few more dabs of color to the canvas of your life, colors that will never blend because you have forgotten to put "first things first," why don't you ask the Holy Spirit to wipe the canvas clean and begin anew by doing what Jesus said here in the instruction booklet, "Seek ye first the kingdom of God and His righteousness and all these things will be added unto you."

"Why call ye me, Lord, Lord, and do not the things which I say?" (Luke 6:46). Here Jesus raises a question vital to our day: "Is it possible to be a Christian without following the clear commands of Christ?"

In the secular world, it is a contradiction of terms to claim one as lord, master, or ruler, while ignoring that individual's known wishes. So in the Christian realm—obedience is inseparable from faith. The converse is just as true. Misunderstanding this divine law produces the two major errors in practice among the twentieth century Christian community.

Some depend on over-conscientious adherance to regulations to prove their spirituality. They compete to find some new rule by which to measure their brother's progress, "teaching for doctrines the commandments of men." Having searched the land for a convert, they load him with burdens such as Peter says, "neither our fathers nor we were able to bear." Too often the babe that pleases Christ,

becomes discouraged, then embittered, trying to please men, and is made "twofold more the child of hell."

The opposite camp are those that depend on the righteousness of Christ, and talk of faith, yet commit sin. Trying to avoid legalism, they condone obvious immodesty. Sabbath desecration adultery, and other sins, all in the name of charity. They negate verbal submission to Christ by open rebellion in practice.

The Spirit of God will guide the honest Christian away from both extremes. Obedience without balanced, vital faith, is legalism. Faith without works is liberalism. Both damn souls at an alarming rate. But "the path of the just . . . shineth more and more unto the perfect day," as the Spirit leads them into all truth.

Missionary Message

A Little Boy Called Fritz (or Eutychus)

He sat on the low cement step and said earnestly, "Are you leaving to-day?" The missionary answered, "Yes." "Will you come back tomorrow?" The answer was "No." "Will you come back the day after that?" "Yes," she replied. Then she inquired. "Why do you ask me all these questions?" The small boy lifted a sad countenance and said, "Because when you are not here I'm not happy." That response made the missionary feel "some kind of way." What kind of way? Well, like she was needed, that someone cared, and that her love for a small little Haitian boy was returned.

All children everywhere are very special people! Jesus thinks so and all who love Him feel the same way. But children on the mission field are extra special! Let me introduce you to Fritz.

When he was only three years of age he was playing contentedly with a baby chick when the mother hen flew into his face, pecking his one eye causing blindness.

Now Fritz is six and a very quick curious little creature. He skips and runs happily along the trails singing songs he had learned in church. His mother and father are voodoo worshippers, but he has two older brothers and a sister who have met Jesus and love Him.

Often he wishes to go with me as I visit in the small villages at Leogane. Depending on his appearance I may send him home to get his trousers since many small Haitian children think a shirt on the top area is suffi-

cient when one is running in play. He likes to carry my cloth drawstring bag that contains my house keys, my Bible, and perhaps medicine depending on our destination.

Recently on a Saturday morning we crossed pole bridges and canals walking through the cane fields to find groups of children to whom I tell stories from the Bible. On that day the story was taken from Acts chapter 20 about Eutychus who fell asleep during one of the Apostle Paul's long sermons who after falling from a window and dying, was returned to life by the power of God. The children loved the story and were fascinated by his name. The next day I was quietly reading in my house when I heard running feet, then Fritz' small voice asking excitedly, "Miss, what was his name again?" I knew without asking who he meant and answered. "Eutychus." He scurried away, repeating the name over and over till in the distance he reached the children he had left to find me. Then I heard him say. "His name was Eutychus!" He had been retelling the story to his other small friends and the long name had been lost to his

On arriving for work the next morning he quickly informed me that his name was no longer Fritz but 'Eutychus.' When I inquired why, he calmly said, "Because he told the people about Jesus and I want to be telling people about Jesus too." So be it!

By some unknown error little Fritz attended our Primary school for a

complete year before we learned that he had never paid his tuition of \$3.00 a year. Since his family is so poor and the money had not reached (five in school out of the eight children) he had just marched in with the others and sat down to learn. Noone asked him if he had paid. Therefore, he decided he could work for his tuition. What kind of work? Well, as the bigger boys cut the grass and rake it (with long knives) Fritz goes along behind them picking up the grass and putting it in the wheel barrow. While doing so you can hear him singing, "Oh, Beulah Land," or "I Remember When My Burdens Rolled Away."

Fritz often comes up with statements that send the missionary into a tailspin as it were - for instance: One day as he was working gathering up paper and other garbage from the yard he returned quite quickly telling me he was finished. I acted surprised and asked him was he sure he had done all the work assigned. Very indignantly he replied, "Miss, do you think I would tell you I was finished if I were not finished?!" Well, with that response I gave him his pennies and he left singing happily.

He is almost always there when the car leaves for the weekly trip into town for supplies. He has heard us pray before we leave many times. Now when we are about to leave we ask him to pray. Would you like to know what he says? Here is a sample: "Father in Heaven, go before the missionaries. Touch Madame Brubaker, touch Mama Miss Cleaver, and help Bro. Brubaker. Take care of them on the road. Help them Father. Amen."

Our little "Eutychus" is learning to read and write, he is hearing more and more about Jesus. We are happy that if Jesus tarries, someday he might have an eye transplant in America and be able to see with both eyes again. He never complains and if you could hear him singing, "I'm Going to run, run, run, to meet my Jesus" as he plays happily with the lid of a paint can and a long stick attached to make it turn as he runs - you would know and agree that children are very special people indeed and you would love "Eutychus" too!

Grace . . .



"Enter into his gates with thanksgiving, and into his courts with praise: be thankful unto him, and bless his name. For the Lord is good; his mercy is everlasting; and his truth endureth to all generations" (Ps. 100:4, 5).

Should not this nation's National Holiday, Thanksgiving, be a day of deep religious significance, and a day of prayer in which gratitude is rendered unto God? George Washington's first Thanksgiving Proclamation, which was lost for 120 years, and finally rediscovered in a public auction in 1921, reads almost like a sermon. In it, he said, "It is the duty of all nations to acknowledge God . . . , to obey His will, to be grateful for His benefits, and humbly implore His protection and favor." Lincoln, likewise, told the people, "We have become too proud to pray to the God who made us." He sent forth a proclamation calling the nation to humility, prayer, and thanksgiving.

Our nation is sailing upon perilous seas, as it were, and in the midst of uncertainty and turmoil, prayer is needed greatly; how wonderful it would be if, collectively, the entire population should elect to humbly hearken to the call to repentance and offer sincere prayers of gratitude for God's bountiful blessings of the past, while, at the same time, asking for Divine guidance to enable each to find his place in the center of God's will, living a life in harmony with God's call to salvation and usefulness in His kingdom.

A serious reflection upon our nation's past history indicates that she has been blessed beyond measure. Yet, in
the midst of countless Divine benefits, the citizenry of
United States have piled sin upon sin, rebellion upon
rebellion, and ingratitude upon ingratitude. The history of
preceding nations leaves a profound record emphatically
revealing that no nation can long endure when its people
disregard God and become haughty, proud, filled with ingratitude, and selfish. In recent years, Americans have
been seeking more and more for less and less. Folk are so
filled with ingratitude, that bountiful blessings do not bring from the heart a sincere expression of thanksgiving.
May the Thanksgiving Season in which we now enjoy
God's blessings stimulate a desire to return to the practice

of rendering sincere thanks to God for each blessing; and may the heart be prompted to begin living courteously among fellowbeings! Courteous living will continuously precipitate the giving of thanks unto God, and to those with whom one associates. The home, office, factory, classroom, and church would profit from such a simple thing as common courtesy being regularly manifested among associates.

It is a tragic thing, actually, to withhold an expression of appreciation from one who is worthy of such commendation, because of the services and kindness rendered. Let all engage in the thanks of appreciation. Appreciation is entering into the true value of a thing. In it is a sensitivity to the beauty, or other fine qualities, of a thing or being. It can be truly said that the grace of God is in appreciation. When one gives the thanks of appreciation for a lovely scenic view, or a lovely sunset, something of God has been received into the soul.

One has said, "Courtesy may be the little pipes by which God's grace comes, but genuine appreciation is like the channels of brooks, streams, and rivers which run full of God's grace. For God is the great Creator, and every creator must have an appreciator."

The thanks of real gratitude is greater than that of courtesy or appreciation. This type of thanksgiving is more than the little pipes, and streams of courtesy and appreciation. It can be compared to the water table beneath the rolling plains of America's "bread-basket" section of the nation. Down deep in the subsoil lies the water table, which may rise or fall; but upon it the plants upon the surface — trees, orchards, and farm crops — are dependent. If the level lowers, the fruitage is lessened, and the land productivity declines. Therefore, gratitude is as the water level by which the land prospers, or fails. The very word "gratitude" has grace in it.

In conclusion, then, the gratitude of men brings the level of God's grace to a point where it is beneficial to the soul expressing his gratitude to God for all of His many blessings. How is the level of your gratitude as you enter into the Thanksgiving season?


Thanksgiving Meditations . . .

I am reminded of the words of the Psalmist David found in Psalms 103:1 & 2 as we prepare for this blessed Thanksgiving time of the year, "Bless the Lord, O my soul: and all that is within me, bless His holy name. Bless the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all His benefits! The Lord has blessed us with a bountiful "Harvest" of benefits. There are specifically four areas that David recalls that God has abundantly blessed him.

The first is found in VS. 3 "Who forgiveth all thine inquities." How good it is to have our iniquities forgiven. The Old Testament prophet Micah said that God would not retain his anger forever, because He delighteth in mercy. Therefore He will have compassion on us and subdue our iniquities, and cast all sins into the depth of the sea. How thankful we ought to be at this blessed Thanksgiving time because our sins are all gone, never to be remembered against us.

The second benefit that David recalls is also found in VS. 3. "Who healeth all thy diseases." It is such a wonderful thing to feel the healing touch of God on our bodies. Doctors perform the needed operations and make the diagnosis, but only God can do the healing. But I believe the Psalmist is making reference to more than just physical healing in this phrase. I believe he was also thanking God for the healing of his soul. The disease of the soul comes from the germ of sin found in the heart of every human being. There is but one cure for the spiritual disease that will lead to spiritual death, and that is the precious blood of Christ. I am so glad that it still heals the soul.

The third benefit or blessing is found in VS. 4. "Who redeemeth thy life from destruction." It is God that prevents destruction from coming into our lives. Millions of people today are destroying their lives with alcohol, tobacco, drugs and many other forms of violence and vice. But we who love the Lord have been redeemed from the destruction of the enemy because we have been brought up out of a horrible pit, and have had a new song put in our mouths, even praises to the Lord Jesus. The enemy would like to destroy all of us, but because of God's mercy we are redeemed from destruction.

Lastly I would have you to note the 4TH blessing that the Psalmist is thankful for in VS. 4, "Who crowneth thee with lovingkindness and tender mercies." If you read the entire 103rd Psalm, you will find that David enlarges on this blessing of mercy in vs. 8, 11, 13, 14 & 17. "The mercy of the Lord is from everlasting to everlasting upon them that fear Him." The songwriter said that it was mercy that changed his life. I'm so glad that the Lord did not give me what I deserved, but showed mercy to my underserving soul.

There are just a few of the things that we should be thankful for at this season of Thanksgiving. Let us never be guilty of taking the Lord for granted for all of the good things that He does for us.

Now to report from a few of our Home Missions areas of labor across this beautiful land of America. The work at Steamburg, New York is making good progress under the able leadership of Pastor David Musser. Bro. Marlin Baum, Bro Tom Bickert
