

WATCH THE WORRY WARTS

The venerable John Wesley said, "I would as soon swear as worry." We as holiness folk maintain a strong Scriptural stand against cursing, blasphemy, and expletives, but we are woefully negligent in the area of worry, deeming it an innocent, inescapable habit. The fact remains, though, that worry, fretting, and anxiety are unhealthy and unscriptural.

Worry depletes us physically and emotionally. Modern medical research has proved that worry breaks down resistance to diseases of the nervous system, particularly that of the digestive organs and heart. Doctors agree that more people die from worry than work because more people worry than work! Some folk carry the weight of three kinds of problems-all they ever had, all they have now, and all they expect to have. Such weight-lifting profits nothing! One person says, "I always feel bad when I feel good, for I know that I'll feel bad after a while." Some people seem to thrive on hearing the worst, but actually they are harming the temple of the Holy Spirit. Medical Doctor Phil Marquart states, "Blessed is the man who is too busy to worry in the daytime and too sleepy to worry at night." A ninetyyear old Negro lady shared the secret of her longevity: "When I works, I works hard, when I sits, I sits easy, and when I worries, I go to sleep." Mildred Jeffrey wrote the following poem:

Last night I started counting sheep
When I had gone to bed,
For I had worries large and small
Which drove sleep from my head.
The sheep had many little lambs,
And these I counted, too;
Thus through the flock I went until
The shepherd came in view.
And then I thought, "Why spend my time
In simply counting sheep
When I can walk with Him awhile, and then
He smiled and said to me,
"Look back; where are your worries now?"
But not one could I see!

Worry deprives us spiritually. Jesus told Martha, "Thou art careful and troubled about many things." She was hurting her spiritual life by rejecting one thing that is needful, meditating on the Word of God. Can we worry when we are praying? Do we fret when we are rehearsing the 8,000 promises of the Bible? Jesus commanded, "Take no thought (don't worry) for your life, what ye shall eat, or what ye shall drink; nor yet for your body, what ye shall put on." Rev. Vance Havner stated that "worry, like a rocking chair, will give you something to do, but it won't get you anywhere." The reason worry is so spiritually constrictive is that, as Jesus demonstrated, worry is worldly- "For after all these things do the Gentiles seek." Jesus was "separate from sinners" and "as He is, so are we in this world." Would Jesus worry about the weather, His taxes, His President, His children, His safety, His finances, His enemies? Our wavering faith displeases God, keeps us from receiving anything from the Lord, and causes sinners to mock our testimony. A man of incredible faith, receiving much from God, and exalted by saint and sinner alike, the man George Muller said, "The beginning of anxiety is the end of faith. The beginning of faith is the end of anxiety." We need to relegate worry into the category of "worldliness" and remember that "they that are after the flesh do mind the things of the flesh; but they that are after the Spirit the things of the Spirit" (Rom. 8:5). Spiritually, we could do nothing more detrimental than become overcharged with the cares of this life.

A washer woman, who was both healthy and holy, shared, "Ah, ain't got no money to lose, so ah never worries about losin' none. Ah ain't got no furniture to lose, for ah gave it to the Lord, and if anythin' happens to it, the Lord did it to His own stuff, not mine. Ah has a fine, healthy body, but if ah gets sick and dies, ah'm goin' to Heaven, and you don't think ah'll worry about that, do you?" She had found the cure for worry warts and corroding cares of our bothered, burdened world, the cure offered by Doctor Peter, "Casting ALL your care upon Him, for He careth for YOU."

BENEFITS OF THE STORM

"Master, the tempest is raging, the billows are tossing high". Our world is being buffeted by many kinds of storms. The storm of emotional upheaval is troubling millions. So much so that some become mentally deranged and in their desperation, commit suicide.

Interpersonal disturbances separate friends and loved ones. Domestic storms abuse wives and children and create havoc in family life. The storm of financial failure is troubling the World Monetary Fund and ruining the economy of some nations. Political intrigue weakens the stability of governments worldwide. The subtle sin of immorality is a severe and socially destructive storm. Its turbulent tide is destroying the breakwaters and foundations on which a stable society rests.

The storm of change is wrecking many churches on the shoals of untried programs and procedures.

Even the elements are disturbed by horrendous storms. Tornadoes, cyclones and just plain thunderstorms with torrential rain and smashing hail accompanied by high winds, have wiped out some communities.

The storm of emotional upheaval—of interpersonal disturbance—of financial failure—of immorality—of change in the Church, as well as storms in the elements are all part of our world experience. All these are negative and not to be desired.

Some might say, 'Yes, we know about storms. What is the point to be made?' The point is, there is another storm much to be desired. We are in desperate need of a storm of spiritual revival. It is disturbing that we know so little of a God sent Holy Storm in our camps, conventions, and church meetings. So much of contemporary Christianity is anemic and shallow. It lacks the positive punch that awakens the conscience, moves the motives and creates an awesome awareness of the Holy Spirit's presence.

Many congregations are basking in a warm summer breeze of planned and pleasing programs. In place of a breeze, we need a storm of Pentecostal power that will pull us out of our comfortable pews to claim territory for God and Holiness.

It cannot be over-emphasized that revival is not an increase in numbers, or of a bulging budget. These things can increase with or without a revival, but they are not revival in themselves; too many church people seem to think they are. True revival is a visible and emotional sense of God's presence in the experience of HIS people. A firestorm of revival will transform individuals, churches and communities.

A careful study will reveal that there are some striking similarities between a storm in the atmosphere and a genuine spiritual upheaval. Thunder is a part of most storms in the sky. Just so, we need to hear the thunder of Sinai from our pulpits. We need preachers who declare "Thus saith the Lord". Away with your carnal crowd-pleasing pious platitudes. Thunder arouses and disturbs. Our preaching should have the same effect. Strong preaching has always been a vital part of our holiness heritage.

It was John Knox, that mighty Scottish man of God, who said: "When I preach I am not master of myself, but I must obey Him who has commanded me to speak plain and flatter no flesh on the face of the earth." Such preaching is not always easy, but it must be done. Without positive preaching, churches will die

Lightning is another feature of a storm. It too, arouses attention and illuminates the surroundings. People need to be aroused from their sleep of ease and catch a true picture of their spiritual standing before God. It is truly remarkable how clearly God's Spirit can reveal the hidden secrets of the human heart.

Often the thunder and lightning is preceded by an awesome stillness that can be felt. Then, suddenly, the fury of the storm breaks upon the scene. The storm of real revival is often accompanied by an ethereal sense of Holy Power as God's presence surrounds His people. Wind is often the power of the storm. Wind is also a scriptural phenomenon. "And suddenly there came a sound of a mighty rushing wind, and filled the house where they were sitting." (Acts 2:2)

Strange things often happen during severe storms. In Jamaica a baby was found in the crotch of a tree, unharmed. The wind had carried her there. Trees have been lifted, roots and all, out of the ground by the pull of the storm. Awesome things happen during a dis-

turbance of the elements. Just so, awesome things will take place in a Godsent New Testament revival. We desperately need to experience such spiritual storms in our church assemblies.

One of the benefits of a storm is its affect on the atmosphere. Before the storm, the air is heavy and humid. One can feel its uncomfortable pressure. Then comes pouring rain and a cleansing of the atmosphere. Things become more pleasant as the rain cleanses, refreshes and renews the earth. Revival storms do just that. The air is cleared, and fellowship is restored. Confessions are made and restitutions are carried out. Heavy hearts are cheered as "Burdens are lifted". When the Church is cleansed, Heavenly showers will fall and souls will be genuinely "Born Again" and truly sanctified.

When revival comes, God is free to work in the Church. Without revival the Church, like Samson, will be weak and ineffective and just another world organization dependent upon human ingenuity.

Man cannot evoke either a storm in the sky or a revival in the church. He can, however, produce an environment in which the storm seed germinates and develops

God's people must not be satisfied with the status quo. They must SEEK God and implore Him to pour upon HIS church, a mighty storm of His Holy Presence. That will accomplish more in a moment than man, with all his schemes and programs, could do in a lifetime.

If the pulpit pours on the truth, Jesus will "Build His Church", and the "gates of Hell will not prevail against it." (Matt. 16:18)

Let us join General Booth and cry, "'Tis fire we want - for fire we plead. Send the fire. We surely need the fire".

PROPHET'S PONDERINGS PRAYER OF A MINOR PROPHET

Study to shew thyself approved unto God 2 Tim. 2:15

This is the prayer of a man called to be a witness to the nations. This is what he said to his Lord on the day of his ordination. After the elders and ministers had prayed and laid their hands on him he withdrew to meet his Saviour in the secret place and in the silence, farther in, than his well-meaning brethren could take him. And he said,

"Oh Lord, I have heard Thy voice and was afraid. Thou has called me to an awesome task in a grave and perilous hour. Thou art about to shake all nations and the earth and also heaven, that the things that cannot be shaken may remain. Oh Lord, our Lord, Thou hast stooped to honor me to be Thy servant. No man takes this honor upon himself save he that is called of God, as was Aaron. Thou has ordained me, Thy messenger, to them that are stubborn of heart and hard of hearing. They have rejected Thee, the Master, and it is not be expected that they will receive me, the servant.

My God, I shall not waste time deploring my weakness nor my unfittedness for the work. The responsibility is not mine, but Thine. Thou hast said, 'I knew thee -I ordained thee -I sanctified thee,' and Thou hast also said, 'Thou shalt go to all that I shall send thee, and whatsoever I command thee thou shalt speak.' Who am I to argue with Thee or to call into question Thy sovereign choice? The decision is not mine, but Thine. So be it, Lord, Thy will, not mine, be done.

Well, do I know, Thou God of the prophet and the apostles, that as long as I honor Thee, Thou wilt honor me. Help me therefore, to take this solemn vow to honor Thee in all my future life and labors, whether by gain or by loss, by life or by death, and then to keep that vow unbroken while I live.

It is time, oh God, for Thee to work, for the enemy has entered into Thy pastures and the sheep are torn and scattered.

And false shepherds abound who deny the danger and laugh at the perils which surround Thy flock. The sheep are deceived by these hirelings and follow them with touching loyalty while the wolf closes in to kill and destroy. I beseech Thee, give me sharp eyes to detect the presence of the enemy. Give me understanding to distinguish the false friend from the true. Give me vision to see and courage to report what I see faithfully. Make my voice so like Thine own that even the sick sheep will recognize it and follow Thee.

Lord Jesus, I come to Thee for spiritual preparation. Lay Thy hand upon me, Anoint me with the oil of the New Testament prophet. Forbid that I should become a religious scribe and thus lose my prophetic calling. Save me from the curse that lies dark across the face of the modern clergy, the curse of compromise, of imitation, of professionalism. Save me from the error of judging a church by its size, its popularity, or the amount of its yearly offerings. Help me to remember that I am a prophet; not a promoter, not a religious manager - but a prophet. Let me never become a slave to crowds. Heal my soul of carnal ambitions and deliver me from the itch for publicity. Save me from bondage to things. Let me not waste my days puttering around the house. Lay Thy terror upon me, oh God, and deliver me to the place of prayer where I may wrestle with principalities and powers and rulers of the darkness of this world. Deliver me from over-eating and late sleeping. Teach me self-discipline that I may be a good soldier of Jesus Christ.


I accept hard work and small rewards in this life. I ask for no easy place. I shall try to be blind to the little ways that could make my life easier. If others seek the smoother path I shall try to take the hard way without judging them too harshly. I shall expect opposition and try to take it quietly when it comes. Or

if, as sometimes it falleth out to Thy servants, I should have grateful gifts pressed upon me by Thy kindly people, stand by me then and save me from the blight that often follows. Teach me to use whatever I receive in such a manner that it will not injure my soul nor diminish my spiritual power. And if in Thy permissive providence honor should come to me from Thy church, let me not forget in that hour that I am unworthy of the least of Thy mercies, and that if men knew me as intimately as I know myself they would withhold their honors or bestow them upon others more worthy to receive them. And now, oh Lord of Heaven and earth, I consecrate my remaining days to Thee; let them be many or few, as Thou wilt. Let me stand before the great or minister to the poor and lowly; that choice is not mine, and I would not influence it if I could. I am Thy servant to do Thy will, and that will is sweeter to me than position or riches or fame and I choose it above all things on earth or in heaven.

Though I am chosen of Thee and honored by a high and holy calling let me never forget that I am but a man of dust and ashes, a man with all the natural faults and passions that plague the race of men. I pray Thee therefore, my Lord and my redeemer, save me from myself and from all the injuries I may do myself while trying to be a blessing to others. Fill me with Thy power by the Holy Spirit, and I will go in Thy strength and tell of Thy righteousness, even Thine own, I will spread abroad the message of redeeming love while my normal powers endure.

Then, dear Lord, when I am old and weary and too tired to go on, have a place ready for me above, and make me to be numbered with Thy saints in glory everlasting. Amen."

THE BEST NEWS OF THE DAY

1 Tim. 1:15 This is a faithful saying, and worthy of all acceptation, that CHRIST JESUS CAME INTO THE WORLD TO SAVE SINNERS; of whom I am chief.

A teacher one day asked her students, "What is the best news that you have heard? One little boy said, "My daddy has been out to sea for a long time. But today, I was told that, he is coming home." Another spoke up and said, "I have never been to the big city: but momma said that we are going soon." Another said, "I am going to get a new Bible." Then one little boy in the back of the room, meekly said, "The best news that I have heard is that Jesus Christ came into the world to save sinners."

The best news that I ever heard was spoken to me a little over twenty-five years ago, on a November, Sunday night, in a little dark bedroom, in Newport News, Virginia. There I lay; a no good, thirty three year old drunkard who had rejected God when a teenager and went out into a life of wickedness and sin. A man who for eighteen years, had lived the life of a drunkard, and a gambler. For I had learned to drink in my early teens and was a confirmed drunkard by the time I was sixteen years of age. This is no exaggeration. And there was times when I would come home in a drunken stupor; never knowing how I got there. There were times when I had to borrow money to buy a few groceries to feed my family, because I had spent my paycheck drinking and gam-

But on that November night in nineteen seventy three, the Holy Ghost slipped into that bedroom, where I was laying, alone, so miserable, and dejected. He began to deal with me about my awful condition. And the more He dealt with me, the more miserable I became. Then He told me that Jesus still loved me, and wanted to save me, After all of those years: Jesus still loved me, and had sent the sweet Holy Ghost to ask me if I would like to be saved. I lay there with the tears streaming down my face, as the Holy Ghost dealt with me about my sinful life. And then He told me, if I wanted to be saved, that I should get out of bed, and ask God for

forgiveness. I put up both hands and cried, "Lord, I want to be saved more than anything in the world." Then I started getting out of bed to seek God; with the tears of sorrow flowing. My knees never even touched the floor, before something struck my soul, and there came such a peace and joy, that I had never known before. And a sweet voice spoke to me, and said, "The work is done: all is forgiven." That night I received the best news that I had ever heard. First, I was told that Jesus still loved me: and then, I was told that he had forgiven me of all of my sins. I have heard from heaven many times since that night. But I do believe that was the best news that I have ever heard. Would you like to know what was the second best news I have ever heard? It was the afternoon nearly two years later, when the Holy Ghost witnessed to my heart that I had been sanctified wholly. Since then, it seems that Heaven has had a good news express running continu-

The best news that fallen humanity has ever heard has been told, and retold, over and over for the past two thousand years: and even today, it is still music to the sinners ear. And that good news is this, "That Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners." For the Scriptures tell us that, "All have sinned, and come short of the glory of God;" think of that! No sinner need give up in despair over his sins. For "The blood of Jesus Christ cleanseth from all sin;" and this cleansing is offered to all men.

God made His plan of redemption available for all men. For all have sinned; every man, woman, boy, and girl. Yet none have to remain lost: for the instructions of Jesus to His disciples, and to us is, "Go ye into all he world, and preach the Gospel to every creature," telling them this wonderful news: "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life. For God sent not His Son into the world to condemn the world; but that the world through Him might be saved." (John 3:16-17)

Jesus not only came to save sinners, but He came to "SEEK AND TO SAVE that which was lost." He never waited

for sinners to come to Him; but He sought, and still seeks sinners so that He might save them from their sins. Every sinner on the top side of the earth can, and should be thankful for the hope that they can find in these words found in God's word, "For the Son of man is come to seek and to save that which was lost." And Jesus has promised them that, "Whosoever cometh unto me, I will in no wise cast out." O sinner, rejoice, take hope, for there is still offered unto you Eternal life. Look at these promises that God, Himself, has sent unto you.

Jer. 50:6 My people hath been lost sheep: their shepherds have caused them to go astray, they have turned them away on the mountains: they have gone from mountain to hill, they have forgotten their resting place.

Ez. 34:6 My sheep wandered through all the mountains, and upon every high hill: yea, my flock was scattered upon the face of the earth, and none did seek after them.

Verse 11: For thus saith the Lord God; Behold, I, even I, will both search my sheep, and seek ther out.

Verse 12: As a shepherd seeketh out his flock in the day that he is among his sheep that are scattered; so will I seek out my sheep, and will deliver them out of all places where they have been scattered in the cloudy and dark day.

Verse 16: I will seek that which was lost, and bring again that which was driven away, and I will bind up that which was broken, and will strengthen that which was sick....

Even in this day of wickedness and sin; He still seeks sinners, wherever they are to be found: and it makes no difference what condition they are in. He never turns away any one who will hear His voice and open the door to their heart. He touched the lepers, and healed then: even though others ran away in fear. He went among the tombstones for the demoniac. He cast out the devils, dressed him up, and sent him home to tell his people what the Lord had done for him. He called the despised tax collector out of the sycamore tree: saved him, and then went home with him for supper. He touched the eyes of the
