OB HAD AN EASTER LONG BEFORE THERE WAS A RESURRECTION. HE PIONEERED THE PATH OF FAITH IN THE DARK AND DIM YESTERDAY BEFORE THERE WAS A WRITTEN WORD OR REVELATION OF CHRIST, THE ETERNAL LOGOS.

Job voices the aspirations of all mankind when he cried, "Oh that my words were now written...printed in a book...or graven in the rock with an iron pen and inlaid with lead. Oh, to be remembered when I'm gone. Oh, that my works and deeds would live on in the heart and mind of others." Yet this wise and wealthy man was already feeling the pangs of desertion and abandonment. If those to whom he had been kind and generous had dropped him already, surely he would be out of their mind before the cold clods fell on his body. The memory of man is short and the work of the worm is sure. His body is as frail as dust. The worms will soon grind his frame to powder. Like soldiers attacking and burning a defenseless city they will plunder his body, strip the hair from the head and face, bore into the eyes, mouth and other cavities and ravish the carcass. He will be gone and

forgotten. If he had only written a book - or raised a monument with his family crest; but it's too late.

Somewhere in his reverie God met Job even as He would meet two disconsolate disciples on the road to Emmaus. Out of this reverie comes the classic announcement, "I know that my redeemer liveth." Job returns from the graveyard knowing in God he has one outside this world as his kinsman. His local kinfolk failed him. They vexed his soul and beat him with their words. Ten times they reproached him and accused him of sin. His familiar friends forgot him. He became an alien, despised by children and those he loved turned against him. He has lost everything except the skin of his teeth. Yet he anticipates the glorious advent of his Kinsman Redeemer. The picture of the Kinsman Redeemer is a powerful and beautiful picture, and Job knew the significance.


The kinsman redeemer must be next to kin to the one in trouble. He must have the resources to bail his ailing kinsman out of trouble. He must be wise enough to remove the injustice, powerful enough to deliver and wealthy enough to lift mortgage or other debts incurred by his poor relative. Also he must be socially willing to identify with the impoverished one.


This is exactly what Jesus Christ has done for us. He is our Kinsman Redeemer. He was unashamed to identify with us socially. Though He was rich, He became poor, that we through His poverty might become rich. He left ivory palaces to be born in a stable, lived in a small village, worked with His hands in the carpenter shop, fellowshipped poor unschooled people and companioned with smelly fisherman. Helpful Web Site




December 13: This morning was the funeral of Sis. Helen Susan from the Millmont congregation. She was a good woman who loved God and is missed. Our condolences to the Family.

hen we speak of our heroes we often speak of people old. When we speak of heroes we often speak of men who are gone—men like Harold Schmul, H. Robb French, Glenn Griffith and George I. Straub. On November 2nd as I stood in line to pay respects to Rev. Tim Dotson, the overwhelming thought was this: Not all my heroes are old. Every generation has its unique dangers, pitfalls and failings. My generation has not escaped those. But that night, I realized that God has heroes for every generation. While we have our share of men and women who are shallow, worldly and faltering, we also have our share of men who stand tall. Men who labor to make the world different because they lived.

Tim Dotson was that kind of man. He exhibited a Christlike spirit wherever he traveled and wherever he labored. No man of age accomplished any more in our movement. The founding of a national holiness youth organization; a successful pastorate culminating in the dedication of a beautiful new church facility; a family music ministry spanning denominations and regions; a ministry of counsel on various boards across our movement; a model husband and father; a deep and passionate love for God's work and way.

It is possible that all of our lives, we will wonder why God saw fit to end Tim Dotson's pilgrimage in 2004. What else might have been accomplished? It is easy to question why God would allow Esther and the children to travel these remaining miles alone. We don't understand the effect on the local church and on our movement. These questions, as with all such questions, must be left with a gracious, eternal God who knows more than we know. We see through the dark glass.

Whatever the case, I have been a different person since I heard the chilling news that Wednesday afternoon. I now look at my fellow pastors across our denomination and movement with deeper respect and appreciation. We are all different with various abilities and talents. God designed each of us for His unique purpose and plan. We may never be a Tim Dotson, but we can, like Tim, use every talent and ability God has given us to advance the Kingdom and leave the world a better place. I also understand more fully, that none of us are guaranteed to live until we are old. We must work while it is day. It is not just accidents that take people. Life is dated on both ends. The time of our beginning we remember, but the time of our ending is known only in another world. "Yesterday is gone, tomorrow may never come, but we have this moment today."

We will not forget Tim. He was a hero—a heroic soldier of the cross! ■

Rev. Timothy Dotson, 37, died suddenly, October 27, 2004. He was the pastor of Emmanuel Wesleyan Church of Gratz and the founder of Youth Challenge. He and his family have been used extensively in song evangelism, having served Penns Creek Camp in recent years. He is survived by his wife, Esther Edwards Dotson; his children, Sharlenae, 12, Brianna, 8, Luke, 6, and Jillaina, 1; his parents Glenn and Ruth Dotson; his sister, Kimberly Walker. Funeral services were conducted at his church with Rev. James Keaton and others officiating.

He would be weary and need rest, lonely and need companionship, forsaken of men but remembered by His Father. Today He is touched with the feelings of our infirmities therefore as our Kinsman He knows how to succor us.

The Kinsman Redeemer must be a man of power, able to bring deliverance. Abraham was Lot's Kinsman Redeemer. Abraham and his army went forth and delivered Lot and his possessions from the kings that had taken him captive. Jesus Christ is our deliverer. He has power to set us absolutely free from power and pollution of sin. Hallelujah!

"He breaks the power of cancelled sin;

He sets the prisner free.

His blood can make the foulest clean; His blood availed for me."

Wesley says it well:

"My chains fell off, my heart was free.

I rose went forth and followed Thee."

Wealth was a necessity if the kinsman was to redeem a poor relative. Gold, silver, precious stones and metal were needed to loosen the chains and break the grip of slavery. The settlement for the poor relative by the Kinsman Redeemer must take place publicly. The customary spot was the market place where there would be many to witness the transaction.

Jesus Christ was the Kinsman Redeemer who did this for you and me. Hell had a mortgage on our soul. The devil was the cruel taskmaster holding us in the grip of slavery, but Jesus Christ came to the market place at Golgotha. There He mounted an old rugged cross, poured out His blood as the price of redemption and consummated a settlement on the resurrection morning for all His bankrupt brothers and sisters. That transaction is a matter of public record. The witnesses are in heaven, earth and hell. Not one is so poor but that Jesus' blood paid the debt. "And ye know that ye were not redeemed with corruptible things, as silver and gold...but with the precious blood of Christ...." I Peter 1:18-19.

"Jesus paid it all;
All to Him I owe.
Sin had left a crimson stain;
He washed it white as snow."

Job says this and more. By faith he saw the Kinsman Redeemer as his

very own. "I know that my Redeemer liveth. All else is gone, the love of my wife, the fellowship of friends, the precious children and my personal wealth, but...I still have Him. He lives; I see Him standing on the earth. He is on top of it all. The Kingdoms of the world have become the Kingdom of God's dear Son. Glory! I am His; He is mine. I will not fear for some day I will stand with Him, a joint heir with Christ, my Kinsman Redeemer." He sees Christ his next of kin standing on the earth and in command. Satan has been defeated, death is conquered, the graves of sainted dead are open. That vision of Christ at the end. promises an end of trouble, sorrow, lies, hypocrisy, heartache and uncertainty. It will be in the flesh, face to face, as friend with friend, in intimate fellowship they "sup together" and hold sweet communion and life's mysteries will be explained. The future as the Redeemer has planned it will be opened. "Then the toil of the road will seem nothing, when we get to the end of the way."

Hallelujah-what a Savior!
